Sport Premium Report 2018- 2019

Introduction

The sport funding is an allocation of money that has been given to all schools to develop their provision for PE and competitive sports. This is how our school has allocated the funding.

Principles/Aims

- To ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of the pupils.
- To develop competence to excel in a broad range of physical activities.
- To ensure the children are physically active for sustained periods of time.
- To enable the children to engage in competitive sports and activities.
- To ensure a higher proportion of children can swim 25m by the time they leave primary school.
- To encourage the children to lead healthy and active life-styles.
- To develop a programme of CPD to ensure all staff are trained to deliver high quality PE lessons.

How Sport Premium money will be used in 2018- 2019

- To fund training for staff in the teaching of PE.
- To fund a PE and Sports Apprentice.
- To continue to provide swimming tuition for Years 1 and 2.
- To buy into the school sports partnership with Arthur Mellows Primary School and ensuring attendance at all festivals and competitions.
- To buy PE resources to enhance the teaching of PE, including DDMIX dance programme.
- To finance a coach travel to attend sporting festivals and competitions.
- Use of Anomoly Screen to provide sports / exercise videos at playtime and lunchtime.
- Use of Anomoly to share important messages with both children and parents regarding healthy lifestyles.

We will measure the impact of sport funding at the end of 2018– 2019 by:-

- The increase in participation in after school sport activities.
- The increase in the success in competitive school sports.
- The school PE provision and meeting the needs of the new national curriculum
- The improvement in quality of teaching and learning across the school.
- The improvement in partnership work with other schools.
- The number of year 6 children who can swim 25m at the end of KS2.
- Our PE and Sports apprentice has successfully passed the apprenticeship.
- Using our end of year pupil and parent questionnaire to ask whether our children have adopted a healthier lifestyle.

The impact of sports funding at end of 2017 - 18

- ✓ 81% of year 6 children could swim by the end of the year
- ✓ The proportion of year 1 and 2 children who could swim by the end of the term increased significantly. Only 4 children in year 1 could swim at the start of the 7 weeks and by the end this had increased to 20 children being water confident and achieving either 1m or 5m certificate.
- ✓ All festivals were attended, both for whole class participation and competitive opportunities.
- ✓ New resources have enabled the teaching of basketball, quick sticks hockey, tag rugby and netball
- ✓ Training for staff has increased their confidence in teaching gym and games skills
- ✓ 4 sporting after school clubs were offered each week, 2 for KS1 and 2 for KS2 - each term the content of the clubs changed, so that more children were encouraged to participate across school.

✓ Anomaly screen is showing exercise videos at playtime and lunchtime.
